

# SITUATION REPORT 9/9/2017 HURRICANE IRMA

The latest forecast models have shown a western shift of Hurricane Irma. As of noon today, the southern portion of Florida was already beginning to experience tropical storm force winds.

Dangerous conditions and storm surge threaten the western side of Florida, which is home to more than 3 million individuals. As of noon, Hurricane Irma had weakened to a Category 3 hurricane, after making landfall in Cuba as a Category 5. Forecasts expect the storm to strengthen, possibly back to a Category 4 or 5, as it leaves Cuba and enters warm water. As of the 11am update, winds of 125mph were reported.

Hurricane Irma has prompted one of the largest, if not the largest, evacuations in U.S. history, with approximately 6.3 million people in Florida under evacuation orders. Florida has over 260 open shelters and are currently housing over 50,000 individuals. This number is expected to rise by tonight. Every county has shelters open, except Monroe (Key West), Monroe County residents should shelter in Miami-Dade.

Hurricane Irma is expected to reach Florida, likely between Key West and Marathon by Sunday morning. Tornado warnings are expected, and have already been posted for Collier County, after radar indicated rotation indicated a possible tornado near Everglades City, Plantation Island, Carnestown and Everglades.

Going South to North (earliest to latest impact) the current forecast model predicts impacts in the following counties: Monroe, Collier, Lee, Charlotte, Sarasota, Manatee, Hillsborough, Pinellas, Pasco, Hernando. There are nearly 3,000 child care programs, who serve almost 180,000 children within these counties. Detailed information appears in below in the Child Care Impact section.

Power outages have already occurred in some areas, Miami-Dade County is reporting 26,270 outages and Broward has 6,790 outages currently reported.


#### Partner Updates

- Children's Disaster Services has forward-deployed to Orlando with a team of 7. They will have additional volunteers arriving early next week.
- Salvation Army has prepositioned assets to provide support in the immediate aftermath of the storm. A few other notes:
  - With vendors closing their doors, securing food may be difficult. 2,261 meals served in Florida so far.
  - Requests for feeding at shelters are coming in rapidly.
  - All mobile feeding units are positioned and ready to deploy once the storm passes.
  - Command Post set up in Tampa to support Hurricane Irma response efforts.
  - Salvation Army has 47 corps community centers (churches with fixed kitchens – many with commercial kitchens) in Florida that can be called on to respond if they are accessible.
  - The storm surge puts a number of Salvation Army facilities at risk.
  - Semi load of water and semi load of MREs are staged the Florida Keys




